

# A letter from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,

Basketball great Michael Jordan was once featured in a commercial that carried a very inspirational and powerful message that resonates with our District today. Jordan stated, "I missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. Twenty-six times I've been trusted to take the game winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over and over again in my life and that is why I succeed."

Michael Jordan was not only a gifted athlete, he was also very wise. We, as a District, share the paradigm we must not be afraid. We must have the courage to try. This not only applies to our students in the classrooms, on the fields, or on the stage, it also applies to our staff members who are working to prepare our students for jobs in the future that are vastly different than the occupations of today.

As of September 28, 2012, our District PreK-12 enrollment was 4,309. The enrollment by building as compared to the same time last year is as follows:

We are excited about the growth patterns we are experiencing in the Camdenton R-III School District; however, we recognize growth within our District presents new challenges. Please find below some of the challenges we are facing during the 2012-2013 school year.

- ◆ Due to our increasing student enrollment we are facing capacity issues in a number of our buildings. Our most pressing need is at Osage Beach Elementary. We currently occupy every classroom in the building plus we had to remodel the vestibule area to create additional classroom space.
- ♦ Dogwood Elementary's capacity according to our District's facility plan is 848. Our current enrollment is 842. While we do have some room to expand, we must remember a large student population is not best practice for early elementary education.
- ♦ At Hurricane Deck Elementary the District's facility master plan identified traffic entering and leaving Highway 5 as a safety concern. Due to the widening of the highway the southern entrance to the property will be closed, adding to the safety concern for this building.
- ♦ During recent meetings with our community's Patron Panel our parents/community noted the need for parity in our District's facilities. Our community desires the same facilities and opportunities in all of our District's buildings. We must not be afraid of taking a "shot" to meet these needs.

This spring the Camdenton R-III Board of Education approved a resolution to support the Missouri Vision Project. This project is a joint effort between the Missouri School Boards' Association and the Missouri Association of School Administrators. This plan has three major goals: create unifying principles to change the education culture in the state, provide schools with guidance as they work to provide increased opportunities in communities, and build trust and support for public education.

As we work to meet the goals of this plan there will be challenges. Like Michael Jordan we must have the courage to rise to our challenges. We must press on to succeed in reaching our vision of "Everyone Learning Every Day."

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



• In November 1998, Missouri voters approved an amendment to the Constitution authorizing Boards of Education to levy up to \$2.75 per \$100 assessed valuation without a vote of the people.

# **Actual Tax Levied for Operations \$2.67**

• This is the part of the school tax levy dedicated to operations (Incidental Fund \$1.33 + Teachers Fund \$1.18 + Capital Projects Fund \$0.16 = \$2.67).

# Tax Required for Debt Retirement \$ .20

• This is the part of the school tax levy set by the Camdenton R-III Board of Education for debt retirement.

# CHS ACT Scores Remain Above the State Average

The Camdenton R-III School District is pleased to announce that the average ACT scores for the graduates of 2011-12 remain above the state average composite scores. The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. These tests are designed to measure the skills needed for success during the first year of college coursework.

# Meeting the Challenge!



Oak Ridge Intermediate, and Hawthorn, Dogwood, Hurricane Deck, and Osage Beach Elementary Schools made national news by working to support and improve the health of our children and our community. As part of their effort, healthy items are featured on their menus and

physical education and activity are emphasized. Their efforts are part of the HealthierUS School Challenge.

The HealthierUS School Challenge (HUSSC) is a voluntary national certification initiative for schools participating in the National School Lunch Program. It supports First Lady Michelle Obama's Let's Move

campaign by recognizing schools that are creating healthier school environments through their promotion of good nutrition and physical activity. Sponsored by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), the initiative encourages all schools to take a leadership role in helping students make healthier eating



and physical activity choices that will last a lifetime. Schools that champion the HUSSC work hard to make changes to their school nutrition environment in order to (1) improve the quality of the foods served, (2) provide students with nutrition education, and (3) provide students with physical education and opportunities for physical activity.

A HUSSC award has four levels of superior performance: Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Gold Award of Distinction. Schools awarded receive a monetary incentive, an award plaque signed by a USDA official, a banner to display in their school, and their name listed on the Team Nutrition website.

To qualify for an award, a school must submit a formal application and meet basic criteria set forth by the FNS. The HUSSC criteria reflect the recommendations of the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, and the Institute

of Medicine recommendations for foods that should be served in schools. HealthierUS Schools must also have a local school wellness policy, as mandated by Congress. Schools receiving a HUSSC award commit to meeting the criteria throughout their four-year certification period.

Special recognition is due to the school food service staff of Oak Ridge, Hawthorn, Dogwood, Osage Beach, and Hurricane Deck for their efforts in achieving school lunch menu changes leading to a HUSSC Silver award.



# Community Comes Together to Support Buddy Pack Program

Lake Regional Health System
is one of many contributors
who understood the benefits of
nutrition and health the Buddy

Pack program provides. Through departmental giving, physician pledges, one-time gifts, payroll deduction, and a generous donation from LRHS, a total of \$45,000 was raised and divided among area schools, which included Camdenton.

Coordinated through the VIPS program, volunteers work each week filling 520 Buddy Packs full of nutritious and child-friendly foods to be sent home with students who may need supplemental food on the weekend in the Camdenton Dogwood, Hawthorn, Osage Beach, and Hurricane Deck Elementary Schools, Camdenton Oak Ridge Intermediate School, Macks Creek Schools, and Climax Springs Schools.

# "Steering the Course for the Future"

I want to sincerely thank everyone for their generosity and support of the Foundation for the 2011-2012 school year.

Thirty-nine teachers and staff enrolled in the payroll deduction process we launched last year as a donation to the Education Foundation. The Foundation matched their donations and awarded four extremely worthy grants with a total of \$4,086 for critical education programs that fall outside the normal operating budget. We recognized the following teachers and their projects, which are targeted to impact over 450 students, at the August 15 Staff Welcome Back breakfast:

- Geana Holland and Jenelle Henry Smartboard and Speaker Anchor for Title 1 Reading Room impacting 50 Hawthorn third and fourth grade students annually
- Erin Kaminski Elmo Document Camera to develop writing and 3D math manipulatives through on-screen projection for 45 Osage Beach Elementary (OBE) fourth grade students
- Carrie Viebrock Two mettalaphones to provide hands-on learning instruments for OBE and Hurricane Deck



These instruments will impact over 330 kindergarten through fourth grade students, expanding the Orff band experience not only at school concerts but as they perform at community nursing homes and rehab centers.

We are continuing the payroll deduction program this year with the intent to award more classroom grants in Spring 2013, and we thank the staff who have enrolled so far.

Last February, the Foundation's Board approved the new Educator Scholarship program aimed at supporting teachers' personal development and aspirations and designed expressly for worthy Camdenton R-III certified

# Patron Panel Addresses Overcrowding and Facility Needs

On October 2, 2012, the District held its first Patron Panel meeting of the 2012-2013 academic year. The Patron Panel is a committee of approximately 30 citizens that includes current parents, parents of

alumni, and non-parents from all parts of the school district. The group has continued its work from last year to help the District meet its challenges that include helping the District identify potential solutions to difficult issues. Some of these

issues include overcrowding and facility needs that take into account the needs of students, parents, and staff.

At each meeting the group's input is documented, then presented back to them in the form of a survey. The results of the intra-panel survey are used to narrow the focus. Allowing for an open discussion and then following it with a survey gives members the chance to truly brainstorm when they are together,

then share more specific thoughts individually once they have had a chance to reflect on the group discussion. "The insight and expertise of this group is extremely valuable as it provides an advisory role to the Board of Education and the Superintendent," stated
