On May 18th, 2013, the Camdenton R-III School District held its 82nd commencement exercises. Three hundred twenty-three seniors were awarded their high school

diplomas. The ceremony was held on a beautiful evening in the Ozarks. Graduation evening is in many ways a microcosm of our school year. The evening would not be possible without the efforts of our faculty, staff, parents, and community members. Their efforts are focused on our students so they may learn and grow into young adults to meet the challenges of the future.

One memory I always cherish about graduation is looking out into the stands and seeing the support system our students possess. Integrated Framework for Transformation). These schools will serve as models for other districts for implementation of school wide inclusive education and interventions.

As a district, we welcome Tom Williams to the Camdenton R-III Board of Education. We also welcome back Nancy Masterson, who will serve her sixth term on the Camdenton R-III School Board.


(School Wide Integrated Framework for Transformation) National Research Study

Camdenton R-III School District is entering a partnership with SWIFT to develop a national professional learning community in which schools from across the country can learn exemplary practices from each other for school improvement and inclusive education that is guided by teacher teams so that ALL students benefit and learn both socially and academically. We want to blur the lines between all available services so that any child who walks through the doors of Camdenton R-III School District has their individual needs met in as equitable, effective, and typical setting as possible.

The importance of general education and special education working together to create multi-tiered systems of support so ALL students learn is critical to the partnership. Camdenton R-III School District was nominated by Dr. Marilyn Friend, a national expert on co-teaching, who has been working with the school district in providing professional development for general education and interventionist teacher teams who co-teach in classrooms together to meet the needs of ALL students. Camdenton R-III School District utilizes co-teaching in preschool through grade 12 in content areas to meet the needs of ALL students with students who learn differently, such as students who are disabled, students who have limited English proficiency, and students who need additional support through Title I. Dr. Friend has stated that she would put the teachers of Camdenton School District involved in co-teaching up against anyone in the country.

Camdenton R-III School District was selected after 11 schools were visited by SWIFT teams in the country and six are participating in this national conversation. Middle School and Hawthorn Elementary are participating in being observed and having multiple conversations with teams from SWIFT. The district component is also being included through conversations to learn the relationship between the building and district in our growth. Community members and parents will also be a part of the conversations through focus groups.

Todd Shockley, Hawthorn principal, commented, "What a thrill it is to be selected as a national model by the SWIFT selection team. In 2006, the Hawthorn staff set about to create a vision for the kind of school Hawthorn would become. Three key indicators were identified that would encompass that vision:



Hawthorn would be a happy school, a model school and a progressive school. It is extremely gratifying to see that vision being realized in tangible ways. The staff of Hawthorn has taken to heart their belief that all children can learn and be successful. They have worked



collaboratively to develop systems and structures to ensure every student gets the time and support he/she needs to achieve identified learning goals. Instructional strategies and professional practices are continually evaluated and refined in order to better meet the unique needs of all our learners. The faculty and staff of Hawthorn Elementary are absolutely ecstatic to partner with the SWIFT Center to enhance the educational experience for all students across this great nation."

Sean Kirksey, Middle School principal also shared, "We are honored to have been selected as a Knowledge Development Site by the SWIFT Center. We are excited for this opportunity to share our effective practices to assist other schools and to improve our school as well. The strength of our school has always been our highly dedicated and effective staff. Our staff has collaborated to develop an effective system of interventions to help all students learn. Their efforts, expertise, and commitment have made this distinction possible."

This selection resulted from the work of all administrators, certified and classified staff in the district. Together we have changed the way we do business at Camdenton R-III School District. A YEAR OF FIRST® FOR CAMDENTON 4-H LASER TEAMS!

This was an exciting year for the Camdenton 4-H FIRST® LASER robotics teams. It literally was a year of many firsts for all divisions of the LASER programs, with over 200 students in fourth through twelve grades participating.



The FIRST® LEGO® League programs at Osage Beach Elementary, Hawthorn Elementary, and Oak Ridge Intermediate had 11 teams travel to Kansas City to compete at the Greater Kansas City Qualifier in November and December. One team from Hawthorn advanced on to the Greater Kansas City Regional, winning "Project Design".

Oak Ridge qualified to advance to regional competition by winning the coveted "Gracious Professionalism" award. At Regional competition, Oak Ridge earned the prestigious "Judges' Choice Award".



Middle school age students in seventh and eighth grade challenged themselves by moving up a level to participate in FIRST® Tech Challenge (FTC) instead of the FLL division. The majority of teams that compete in the FTC division are high school students. This did not deter the Camdenton Middle School team members as they worked and pushed to have five FTC teams travel to UMKC to compete in the qualifier. In true Laker fashion, the students ended up having all five teams in the top twelve ranking during the event. In the semifinals, two of the LASER teams competed against each other to earn the chance to compete to move on to the State championship. One team

was a finalist and qualified





to compete at the State

championship at University of Missouri Science and Technology. At the State championship, the LASER FTC team ended the State tournament ranked 11th overall.

The high school FIRST® Robotics Challenge team tackled the toughest engineering challenge in the four-year history of the program. Students had to engineer, design, fabricate, program and market a robot that would shoot Frisbees (both autonomous and driver controlled) and then climb a tower



that was over 100 inches tall. The game "ultimate ascent" was played in alliances of three teams where offense, defense, and strategy all come into play.

LASER 3284 traveled to St. Louis and competed

against 43 teams from the United States. LASER left with a championship banner and was named the alliance captain, which qualified the team for a third trip in just four short years to the World Championship where 37 countries competed for the World title. In addition to winning the overall regional, 3284 was awarded the Underwriter's Laboratory Safety award for the third year in a row and the team also captured the Entrepreneur award.

Team 3284 traveled to the World Championship armed with a well-designed robot and an experienced drive team. The LASER team battled its way through three days of practice and



competition rounds where, in the alliance selection, they were asked to join the number two alliance to compete on the Galileo World finalist field. After a highly contested battle, the LASER team fell in the final match and medaled as a finalist, ending their amazing season as one of the TOP eight alliances in the world!

Camdenton R-III will be only the second school in Missouri to have the full progression of FIRST® programs with the addition of the Jr. FIRST® LEGO® League (JrFLL) that will serve students in kindergarten through second grade. JrFLL is a simple introduction to STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math).

To cap off the amazing season by all FIRST® LASER teams, the Camdenton R-III Afterschool Services offices

are proud to announce that they will be the Central Missouri host for an official FIRST® LEGO® League qualifier. The event will bring numerous teams and individuals to the community to stay overnight in November. Many volunteers will be needed to help host and run the tournament. Tami Moulder has been selected as the Elementary Teacher of the Year. She has been a third grade teacher for the Camdenton R-III School District for her entire 28-year career. Moulder attended Camdenton schools from 1976-1980,

graduated from Ash Grove High School and earned her degree from College of the Ozarks.

"I don't believe I chose teaching as a profession. I believe it chose me," enthuses Moulder. She credits her father, who has been an educator for more than 48 years, as her "huge inspiration." Seeing the positive influence he had in the lives of his students allowed her to realize the impact she, too, could have in the lives of children. Establishing a "family atmosphere" is a priority from day one each year in Moulder's classroom. Seeing the growth in her students from the beginning of the year to the end of the year is very rewarding. "I wanted to be a teacher for as far back as I can remember," said Denise Dill, Camdenton R-III School District's Educator of the Year. Dill has been an educator for 20 years, the past ten of them in the district. She was nominated for this

honor by her building principal, Christy Page, and is currently a fourth grade teacher at Hurricane Deck Elementary. She earned an Associate of Arts degree from East Central, Union, her Bachelor of Science in elementary education from Lindenwood University and her Master of Science in education from Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar.

Dill loves watching the students grow and gain confidence in their own abilities - academically, socially and in making good choices. While there seems to be more to teach than there is time, working with kids teaches her to be flexible, creative, and open to new ideas. "Time and pace are the most frustrating aspects of my job, [but] I enjoy working with children and learning along with my kids," says Dill. She hopes that she is a part of making a difference in the life of each of her students.

Recently she has incorporated *The Leader in Me* approach, teaching students to use goal notebooks to track their learning. Employing increased technology through the use of computers, the internet and a Smart Board has engaged her students more actively in learning. She also uses Kagan Cooperative Learning strategies. To stay involved in learning herself, she is serving on the Communication Arts Vertical Team and the fourth grade Math Club. She is a member of MSTA, CTA, and Beta Sigma Phi.

"I have enjoyed living and teaching in the Lake area for the past 10 years," states Dill. Her husband, Jim, is an EMT for the Lake West Ambulance District, and her son, Jake, is a Firefighter for the Sunrise Beach Fire Protection District. She enjoys, softball, volleyball, walking, fishing with her husband, and reading a good book.

LAKER TEAM PHYSICIAN, Dr. CHRIS LESLIE, INDUCTED INTO THE MISSOURI SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Congratulations to our Laker team physician, Dr. Chris Leslie, who was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in a ceremony in Jefferson City on April 14, 2013.

Dr. Leslie first realized his love of sports and medicine while standing on the sidelines as a ten-year-old watching the Jefferson City Jays with his father, fellow Hall of Famer, Dr. James T. Leslie, who was the team physician for Coach Pete Adkins for over 40 years. Dr. Leslie decided he wanted to follow in his father's footsteps and become an orthopedic surgeon as it was the ultimate opportunity to combine his love of sports and medicine.

Upon establishing his orthopedic surgery practice specializing in sports medicine and total joint replacement in 1991, he realized he was raising his family in the middle of another sports dynasty, the Camdenton Lakers. For the past 23 years, he has had the privilege of serving as the team physician for the Lakers' sports programs. Leslie teamed up with fellow Hall of Fame inductee, then-Athletic Director and Football Coach Bob Shore, to provide a program that included immediate access for acute treatment of injuries as well as preventative education about sports-related issues for both the athletes and the community. Volunteering his time on the sidelines and in his office has been a pleasure for Dr. Leslie, who has also awarded scholarships to graduating seniors who exemplify the strong character traits expected in Lakers.

While actively involved in sports medicine in the Lake area, Dr. Leslie has also had the privilege of serving as a consulting surgeon to several orthopedic companies, which have involved designing new orthopedic

implants for joint replacement. He is currently serving as the medical director for Consensus Orthopedics where he is the lead design surgeon for a new knee design prosthesis. He also completed the new hip design prosthesis for Iconacy Orthopedics. As a surgeon for American Surgeons International, he was able to perform surgery and train surgeons nationally and internationally. He lectures throughout Europe, South America, the Middle East and Australia on the latest in sports medicine and joint replacement technology.

Along with his commitment to the Lakers, Dr. Leslie has also been very active in our community. He has served on the board of directors for Lake Regional Health System, as well as chief of the medical staff and chairman of surgery. He has been president of the board of directors for the Tri-County YMCA for over 15 years. He is a director at First National Bank and on the Laker Booster Board. Dr. Leslie and his wife, Susan, raised two Lakers, Jeff (2003) and Sallie (2007), who also married Lakers, Tara and Tyrus.







Missouri Bright Flight Scholars

A+ Scholars

Camdenton High School is one of 520 high schools in Missouri designated as an A+ School by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. The A+ Schools Program was created by state law as an incentive for improving Missouri's high schools. The primary goal of the A+ Schools Program is to ensure that all students who graduate from Missouri high schools are well prepared to pursue advanced education and/or employment.

One of the significant benefits of the program is that a designated A+ School may offer scholarships to students who maintain a minimum of a 2.50 Grade Point Average (GPA), attend school with a 95 percent attendance rate, complete 50 hours of unpaid tutoring and remain a good citizen.



National Merit Students

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarship that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the PSAT as a junior. This test is the initial screening of approximately 1.5 million students each year. As the competition narrows, 34,000 will become commended, 16,000 will be considered semifinalists, and 15,000 become national finalists. This year the class of 2013 has three students who have achieved this distinguished honor: **Katelyn Goodwin, Logan Gilbert, and Jacob Harmon.**

In addition, two students from the class of 2013 were selected as National Merit Scholar Finalists and were among 8,300 students from across the country who received Merit scholarships: **Kyle Gulshen and Rose Anderson.**

Missouri Scholars 100 Program

Each year the Missouri Association of Secondary School Principals sponsors the Missouri Scholars 100 program. This program recognizes 100 of Missouri's top scholars statewide. Students are selected based on a ten-event academic decathlon including grade point average, ACT/SAT scores, activities, advance classes, leadership and community service. **Kyle Gulshen and Rose Anderson** have received this recognition.

Missouri Scholars Academy

The Missouri Scholars Academy is a three-week academic program for approximately 330 of Missouri's gifted students who are ready to begin their junior year in high school. Schools nominating students for the academy are required to provide specific information to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. Participants are selected on the basis of criteria set by the Department of Education. **Katelyn Goodwin and Jacob Harmon** represented the class of 2013 at the Scholars Academy.




Science Research 2013



Congratulations are in order for the seventh year in a row as two Camdenton High School students, under the Science Research program led by Christopher Reeves, represented Missouri at the Intel International Science & Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Phoenix, Arizona. Alaina Sonksen and Connor Burton were awarded cash prizes totaling \$4,000 for their research projects. More than 1700 students from nearly 80 countries compete in this, the largest pre-college science competition in the world. Only 18% of all countries and states involved in the ISEF receive an award of any type.


Alaina Sonksen, with her groundbreaking research, determined the physiological effects of bath salts on living organisms. Her research determined, contrary to her hypothesis, that bath salts reduce activity levels, willingness to eat, and increase mortality rates. These findings were found even though the active ingredient in bath salts mimics cocaine and ketamine, both stimulants, with ketamine also being classified as a hallucinogen. For her work, Alaina earned a \$1,000 cash award.



Connor Burton received two awards totaling \$3,000 for his original research that determined that jellyfish respond to specific wavelengths of infrared light. His discovery is new to the scientific world, and is currently being reviewed for publication in a peer-reviewed journal. His project found that jellyfish respond to infrared light that is invisible to the human eye. Connor has also proposed the possibility of deterring jellyfish from sensitive areas such as recreational beaches and industrial water intakes, which are regularly clogged by jellyfish "blooms."
