

A letter from the Superintendent

Dear Friends,

The mission of our school district is to create a learning community that maximizes each individual's performance for future success. The Camdenton R-III District believes part of this success is for our students to be happy "when they grow up."

We know the future of our youngest students will be vastly different from the reality we live in today. Thanks to your support, our district will be able to ready our students for the future. Through your approval of our April ballot issue, students at Osage Beach Elementary and Hurricane Deck Elementary will have state-of-the-art facilities to meet the challenges of the future.

Work is beginning on our new elementary building at Osage Beach and our expanded and remodeled building at Hurricane Deck. Soil samples have been taken at both locations and some clearing of the Osage Beach property has been completed. The architects have worked with staff members to draft construction documents. These documents will be used to inform interested general contractors. The timeframe for the presentation of bids for Osage Beach and Hurricane Deck will be this fall with construction beginning in early winter for these buildings. Completion of these projects is slated for the spring of 2015.

Over the summer, the district constructed secure entry access points at Camdenton Middle School and Dogwood Elementary. These entry points have a buzzer and a video system that visitors need to utilize in order to enter the building after the school day begins. School personnel verify the visitor's identity and buzz the individual into the building. As a visitor enters the building, he/she must check in at the office before access is granted into the rest of the building. These features help us provide a quality learning environment for our students. During the summer of 2014, these secure entry

points will also be installed at Hawthorn Elementary and Oak Ridge Intermediate schools.

Late this summer the district received its Annual Performance Report from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. This report gauges our performance on five indicators. These indicators include:

- 1. Academic Achievement
- 2. Subgroup Achievement
- 3. College and Career Readiness
- 4. Attendance Rate
- 5. Graduation Rate

The Camdenton R-III District received 135.5 points out of a possible 140 points for a percentage of 96.8%. This places the Camdenton R-III School District among the top 11% of the districts in the State of Missouri as we compare Annual Performance Report scores.

This high level of achievement is a testament to the dedication of our students, staff, parents, and patrons of our district. While we are very proud of this level of performance, we also must be cognizant of the ever-increasing level of performance we must attain. With this said, we must strive to be the best while at the same time understand we are teaching more than academics. We must also help our students build a foundation for a happy life.

As of September 25, 2013, our district PreK-12 enrollment was 4,359. The enrollment by building as compared to last year is as follows:

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

2013-2014 Financial Data



CHS ACT Scores Remain Above the State Average

The Camdenton R-III School District is pleased to announce that the average ACT scores for the graduates of 2012-13 remain above the state average composite scores. The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. These tests are designed to measure the skills needed for success during the first year of college coursework.

Preparing every child for success in school and in life.

The Missouri School Improvement Program (MSIP) 5 is designed to prepare every child for success in school and life. MSIP 5 is the state's school accountability system for reviewing and accrediting public school districts in Missouri. MSIP began in 1990 and is entering its 5th version this year.

The five areas in which the state measures our effectiveness are Academic Achievement, Subgroup Achievement, College and Career Readiness, Attendance Rate, and Graduation Rate. The Camdenton R-III School District scored a 96.8% out of a possible 100%.


The score of 96.8% places Camdenton in the 11th percentile of all of the schools in the state. Comparing our number to schools that we are familiar with, we perform very well.

Camdenton R-III to host Mid MO FIRST® LEGO® League Qualifier



Camdenton R-III Schools is pleased to announce that it has been selected by *FIRST*® to be the Mid MO host for an upcoming 24-team qualifier tournament. The tournament is sponsored by the Camdenton 4-H *FIRST*® LASER 3284 World Championship Finalist team.

Twenty-four teams from the state of Missouri will converge on Camdenton High School for opening ceremonies on November 16 at 9:00 AM to compete in the 2013 *FIRST*® LEGO® League (FLL) robotics "Nature's Fury"! The FLL tournament is comprised of teams with students who range from ages 9 to 14. Teams of up to ten participants, with one adult coach, participate in the challenge by programming an autonomous robot to score points on a themed playing field (robot game), developing a solution to a problem they have identified (the project), all guided by the FLL core values.

FLL is an international program created in a partnership between *FIRST*® and LEGO®, based on a common belief that fun and learning go hand-in-hand, and that an inspired mind can accomplish anything. Using LEGO® MINDSTORMS® technologies and LEGO® materials, children work alongside adult mentors to design, build and program robots to complete missions based on real-world challenges. After an intense build season, the competition culminates at high-energy, sports-like tournaments.

During the November 16 event, Camdenton schools will also showcase exciting STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math)



activities that are being taught within the district. Spectators can engage in hands-on activities and learn more about the importance of STEM in their communities.

"The Camdenton R-III District is proud and honored to host this tournament. This event is an incredible learning opportunity for our students, parents, and patrons.

Also, by hosting this event on our campus, our community benefits economically by bringing visitors from all over mid-Missouri to the Lake area. This event would not be possible without the efforts of our faculty members in charge of the robotics program and the support from our community", shared Dr. Hadfield.

The event is free and open to the public. Opening ceremonies start at 9:00 AM and awards will wrap up around 3:00 PM. Concessions will be available throughout the day's events. Over 50 community and *FIRST*® volunteers will be assisting with the tournament.

Third in the Nation Skills USA Nationals

This past summer, nearly 6,000 outstanding career and technical education students (who were all state contest winners) competed in 98 different hands-on trade, technical and leadership fields. Students work against the clock and each other, proving their expertise in their chosen occupation. Contests are run with the help of industry, trade associations, and labor organizations, with test competencies being set by the industry.

Justin Sherill, an adult student in Larry Wittrock's Marine Service Technology program, placed 3rd in the nation at the SkillsUSA Nationals. This is the second year in a row that Justin has received the bronze medal award in the Marine Service Technology program at the national level.

A Trip of a Lifetime

It was the trip of a lifetime for educator Chris Reeves' International Baccalaureate (IB) and marine biology students. This group had the opportunity to visit Belize for eight days and immerse themselves in activities ranging from scuba diving a coral atoll island to participating in a humanitarian mission with school children on the island.



During their first two days on the island, the students stayed at a tropical research facility in the heart of the Belize rainforest. They experienced guided hikes, cave tubing, and zip-lining through the canopy of the rainforest, as well as

visiting a Mayan ruin to learn, firsthand, about the Mayan culture through the eyes of a Mayan guide. They were also able to visit the school they have adopted. School children in Belize do not have access to public education, and their families are responsible for the cost of sending their children to school. Those families can pay up to 20% of their annual income to educate their children each year. Our Camdenton High School students were able to donate six large boxes of school supplies to their adopted school.

The final days of this fantastic experience were spent on Glovers Atoll, an island 50 miles offshore. The United Nations has designated this island as a World Heritage site because it



represents one of the best examples in the world of a pristine coral reef. Our students were able to have guided scuba excursions during this time as well as the opportunity to visit an adjacent

island that is owned by the Wildlife Conservation Society. This island is used for research by scientists all over the world to conduct research on native sharks and grouper. For the first time, students were able to conduct their own research on-site and a science research student at CHS will be presenting her findings at various state, national, and (hopefully) international research competitions.

IB and marine biology students are currently planning a return trip to Belize to continue their support of their adopted school and to enhance their research passion.
